## Architectural Heritage in Rural Tourism



Created by Luiz Carvalho from Noun Project The UNESCO 1972 World Heritage Convention indicates as cultural heritage monuments, group of buildings and sites, outstanding universal value from the point of view of history, art or science.

A historical building is a complex system of spaces, volumes, materials, surfaces, constructive aspects, actual and past functions and configurations, degradation, etc. The whole is the result of a continuous historical process of modification and transformation. An architectural heritage can be interpreted as an "artifact", where its elements are witnesses of constructive cultures and of events occurred during the life of the building. An architectural heritage are monuments of artistic, historic or scientific interest – buildings to be protected and preserved. Architectural heritage has great potential to motivate visits to tourism destinations.





## **Tangible Heritage**

Tangible Cultural Heritage refers to physical artifacts produced, maintained and transmitted inter-generationally in a society. It includes artistic creations, built heritage such as buildings and monuments, and other physical or tangible products of human creativity that are invested with cultural significance in a society.

Tangible cultural heritage refers to things that we can store or physically touch.

Examples of tangible cultural heritage include immovable heritage - architecture, monuments, buildings, and also movable heritage – traditional clothing, tools, or artwork.

#### Monuments:

architectural works, works of monumental sculpture and painting, elements or structures of an archaeological nature, inscriptions, cave dwellings and combinations of features, which are of outstanding universal value from the point of view of history, art or science;

#### Groups of buildings:

groups of separate or connected buildings which, because of their architecture, their homogeneity or their place in the landscape, are of outstanding universal value from the point of view of history, art or science;

#### Sites:

works of man or the combined works of nature and man, and areas including archaeological sites which are of outstanding universal value from the historical, aesthetic, ethnological or anthropological point of view.



Cultural heritage reflects and shapes values, beliefs, and aspirations of people. A comprehensive framework for the preservation of cultural heritage including cultural sites, old buildings, monuments, shrines, and landmarks that have cultural significance and historical value Is needed to affirm our identity and integrity, and to define people's national identity.

It is recognized that the preservation of heritage buildings has environmental sustainability benefits. Conserving heritage buildings reduces energy usage associated with demolition, waste disposal and new construction, and promotes sustainable development.

## Intangible Heritage

Cultural heritage does not end at monuments and collections of objects.

Many parts of culture, are intangible, including for example song, music, dance, drama, skills, cuisine, crafts and festivals. They are forms of culture that can be recorded but cannot be touched or stored in physical form, like in a museum, but only experienced through a vehicle giving expression to it.

Intangible heritage includes traditions or living expressions inherited from our ancestors and passed on to our descendants, such as oral traditions, performing arts, social practices, rituals, festive events, or the knowledge and skills to produce traditional crafts.


### JANUS MOTORCYC

UNESCO's 2003 Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage proposes five broad 'domains' in which intangible cultural heritage is manifested: - Oral traditions and expressions, including language as a vehicle of the intangible cultural

- Oral traditions and expressions, including language as a ve heritage;
- Performing arts;
- Social practices, rituals and festive events;
- Knowledge and practices concerning nature and the universe
- Traditional craftsmanship.





# Heritage Interpretation



Created by Luiz Carvalho from Noun Project Heritage interpretation is an educational activity which aims to reveal meanings and relationships through the use of original objects, by firsthand experience, and by illustrative media, rather than simply to communicate factual information.


Heritage interpretation refers to all the ways in which information is communicated to visitors to an educational, natural or recreational site, such as a museum, park or science centre.

Heritage interpretation may be performed at dedicated interpretation centres or at museums, historic sites, parks, art galleries, nature centres, zoos, aquaria, botanical gardens, nature reserves and a host of other heritage sites. Its modalities can be extremely varied and may include guided walks, talks, drama, staffed stations, displays, signs, labels, artwork, brochures, interactive audio-guides and audio-visual media.




Heritage interpretation serves to facilitate the achievement all of these purposes: it aims to enrich experiences, stimulate activity and widen knowledge. Interpretation is a method for helping visitors understand the character of the place, explaining its meanings, providing experiences and provoking emotions.

Heritage interpretation enhances the visitor experience.






Heritage interpretation is important for rural tourism. It strengthens the attractiveness of a site and can lead to economic benefits for the rural area.






